Prospect St. appears on the first map of Northampton, dated 1794, as a loop around the eastern side of Round Hill. It connected on the north and south with the Stage Road from Northampton westwards (now known as Elm St.). The second map of the town dated 1831 shows a house on this site, identified on subsequent maps of the 19th century as the Wright homestead. Directories from 1860 to 1885 list William K. Wright, a piano tuner, at this address.

This house probably dates from the early 19th century and was extensively remodeled around 1900. The Prospect St. end of the house is two bays wide and pedimented with modillions supporting the cornice. The tympanum has a stylized Palladian form with louvered side forms and tall central window. The southern side of the house is three bays wide and has a central, pedimented portico with Doric columns. The entrance projects slightly and has sidelights, and is covered by a semi-circular balcony. On either side is a French window. The other windows in the house have plain surrounds and six over six sashes.
