	Parker R. Whitcomb purchased a large tract of land known as the Bright Estate from Dr. Blodgett about 1881. Whitcomb proceeded to erect a number of cottages on the property. By Jaunuary 1883, Whitcomb had built several cottages on "Bright Street" and planned to build others; in June 1884, a total of nine cottages had been built along the new street. Whitcomb rented the dwellings whose style and proximity to the center of Northampton made them popular; residential development of the section of State Street south of Summer Street to Main occurred at this time, with brick and wooden single family homes predominati Whitcomb retained the cottages in Bright Street until the early 1900's; in 1905 he sold #32, known as lot #3, to Charles Chesney. This cottage is one of three exhibiting characteristics of both stick and shingle styles. The transitional styling features elements of the stick style like framing of gables and the articulation of structural elements in the wall surface. Elements of the Queen Anne are also present: the moreplacid massing of the structure and the sweeping roof surfaces which enclose porch spaces and enclude them in the body of the house. Shingling is a prominent decorative element but is confined within gables or small panels and does not flow across wall surfaces as in later	.ng.
