9. Historical Significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

The Whitcomb family owned this parcel of land and land near it throughout the nineteenth century. David B. Whitcomb purchased, for \$300, a tract of land running from King Street to the Hampshire and Hampden Canal, in November of 1829. The canal ran along what is now State Street. In the second half of the century, members of the Whitcomb family held title to the "one acre with buildings" on Park Street.

The homestead includes two structures dating from the nineteenth century. Located closest to the intersection of State Street and Trumbull Road is a two story brick structure with ridge roof, stone window lintels and paired end chimneys. The width of the lintels and entranceway details indicate that this portion of the homestead dates from the 1830's or 1840's. A second mass of equal size is joined to the earlier structure. The later portion, also of brick, is capped by a stiff mansard roof from which dormers project. (It is likely that the earlier portion acquired its dormers at this period as well.) Fenestration in the 1880's addition is less regular but the size and shape of the windows are consistent throughout.
