

Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above) The northern corner of Park (now Trumbull Rd.) and King Sts. remained undeveloped until the turn of the 20th century. King St. Brook, which began between Round Hill and Childs Park ran through here, and probably made the surrounding land too swampy for buildings. During the latter part of the 19th century the brook was put underground, enabling the land to be residentially developed. This house is two-and-a-half stories inheight with gable end to the street. The gable is pedimented and contains a double sash window within. A one-story porch with gabled entrance extends across the two bay facade. The porch has square posts, a balustrade and square newel posts. The original owner appears to have been Joseph Gagne, a Pleasant St. liquor dealer.
