In 1922 Samuel W. Lee took out a permit for this brick house, to be constructed at a cost of \$30,000. The eventual occupant was Harold Lee, secretary of the Corticelli Silk Co. in Florence.

The house is two stories in height with slate ridge roof and two massive end wall chimneys. The symmetrical, five-bay facade has a central, 2 and 1/2 story, gabled pavilion which contains the main entrance.

Karl Scott Putnam was Northampton's most prominent architect of the first half of the 20th century. He was the son of Roswell F. Putnam a local architect of the turn-of-the-century period and joined his father's firm after training in the New York office of Edward Tiltom. Karl Putnam joined Smith College in the early 1920's. Mr. Putnam is best known for his work in the Colonial style of architecture.
