9. Historical Significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

J. R. Trumbull purchased the parcel on which this residence was built from C. N. Talbot in 1866. By 1873 the cross-shaped brick dwelling had been erected.

The design is cross-shaped, with strongly vertical masses topped by elaborate paired chimneys. Projecting eaves are enhanced by wooden vergeboard; original windows have brownstone surrounds and sills. At the ground level is a bay decorated with bands of stone. The entrance porch exhibits stick decoration similar to that in the gables.

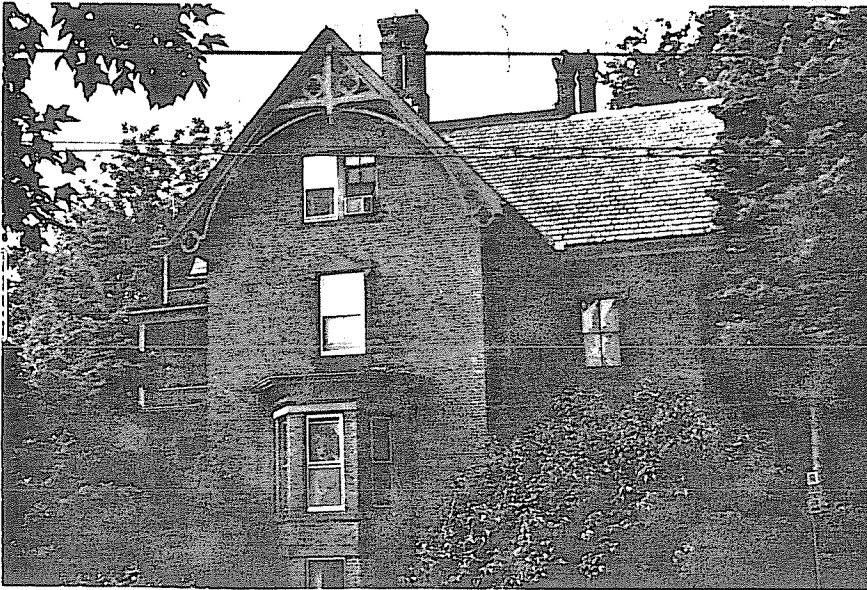
