

GIVE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF HISTORIC IMPORTANCE OF SITE (Refer and elaborate on theme circled on front of form)

The Smith College Archives give no firmly documented facts concerning this house, but from the referebces listed it would seem to have been built in the late 18th century by a William Lyman and occupied by that family for some years. In the 1850's it was the "parsonage" (or manse) of a Dr. Gordon Hall, a local pastor, and in the 1880's was used as a residence hall by Smith College and called Tucker House because of the woman who ran it. Later it became a public inm, used largely by visitors to the college; and in still later years and up to the 1960's was called the Brass Knocker and managed by Miss Edith Parker. In 1967 it was purchased by Smith College as a residence for graduate students and named the Elizabeth Drew House in honor of Miss Drew, a visiting lecturer at Smith for over 20 years, until her recent retirement and death.
