


	This bracketed house was built between 1867 and 18/1 for S. G. Dickinson, a local merchant. Dickinson built a block of stores, still standing, on upper Main Street in 1260. Wm. F. Pratt was the architect of the commercial block and may have been responsible for this house on Center Street as well. The Methodist Church acquired the property in 1871 and used the house as the church parsonage for a number of years. (The Methodist Church was located on the lot to the south, where the Elks Hall currently stands.) Pres ently used as an office byilding, the house has been well maintained.
