


ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The building is T-shaped with the long leg facing Center St. Each end is pedimented, with the front pediment projecting beyond the facade and supported by a two-story colonnade with thick Tuscan columns and patterned balustrade.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The Elks Home was constructed in 1913-14 at a cost of \$40,000. It was built on the site of the former Methodist Episcopal Church and since it is located at the foot of Masonic St. has a long line of sight to Main St.
