Peabody & Stearns of Boston were the principal architects of College buildingsthrough the late 1880's, at which time William C. Brockeslby of Hartford began to work for the school, designing residences, lecture halls, and the gym. Tyler is similar in style to Albright house, located on Bedford Terrace and built in 1899. The mass is capped with a steep hipped roof and the ends of the block defined by strongly vertical chimneys and sculptural gables. Window openings are regular with stone lintels or recessed brick arches. A porch supported by Doric columns spans the ground level of the facade.
