	The Academy of Music was designed in 1891 by William Brockelsby. "It represents the new style introduced to the U. S. by McKim, Meade and White, and is based on the rich brick and terra cotta architecture of late 15th and early 16th century Italy. The two story facade is crowned by a pediment resting on lavishly ornamented pilasters; the cast terra cotta trim is the same warm and tawny tone as the brick and its created symbols appropriate the function of the building. The Academy is also a fine example of 19th century rationalism. Its mass is articulated to reveal the different spaces within, and its exterior is detailed in a hierarchical fashion. The entrance and the first two bays of the side of the building are of golden Roman brick with generous terra cotta trim; the next portion has less ornamentation and introduces a less expensive, dark red brick: this part is clearly revealed as the theater	

itself. Finally the stage house is shown, not only through the silhouette but also through its straightforward character; it is totally of the red brick and the only embellishments are the handsome early maps, etc.)
