The first true apartment building appeared in Northampton in 1910. Four year later the McCormick Apartment Block was built at a cost of \$60,000. This was the largest such block ever built in the city, containing thirty apartments. The block presents a facade of four stories to New South St., but since the street is elevated the lower two floors of the southern end are hidden, and make the block six stories tall.

The building is divided into three section on New South St., with the central section slightly recessed. Each division has a central entrance and a short pentroof of red tile supported by large brackets. The end sections have recessed porches with wrought iron rails on the upper floors above the central entrance, flanked by a pair of double and triple windows on either side. The central section has double windows above its central entrance, with recessed porches flanking these windows on either side as well as a triple window on each side.
