This house was built during the 1920's on Fruit St. The street had been laid out in the 1820's, but most of the western side became part of the Fort Hill estate originally owned by Samuel Whitmarsh. The first known owner of this house was Josef Karankiewicz, who is listed here in the 1930 directory. Mr. Karankiewicz was co-owne of the Northampton Paint Co. on Pleasant St. The house features a flaring gambrel roof with large shed dormers to the front and rear. The central entrance on the facade has a similar, flaring gambrel canopy, supposted by large brackets.
