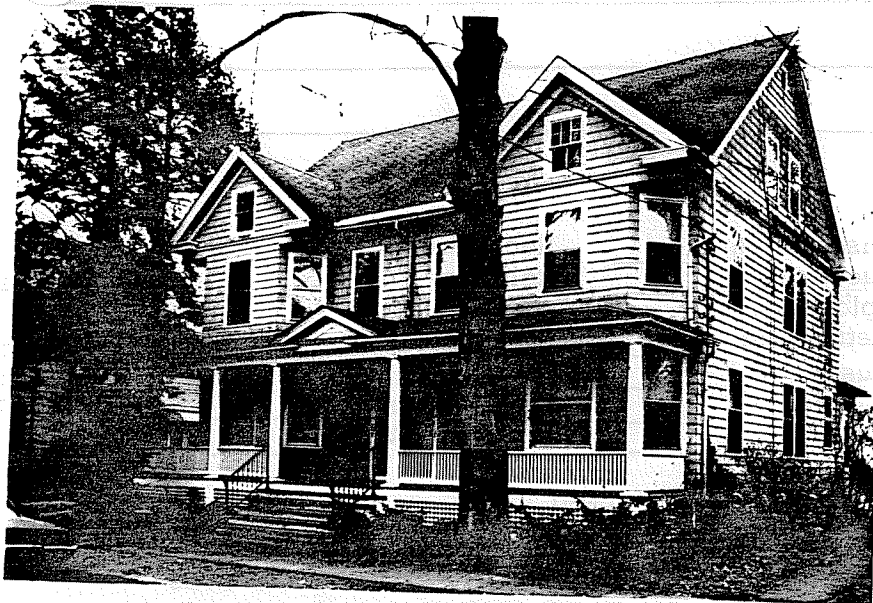

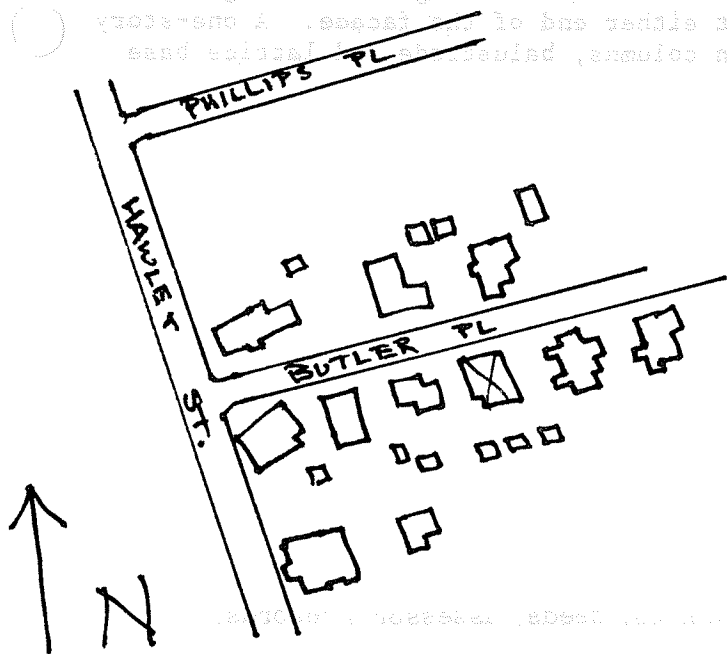

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

Butler Place was opened in 1892 through the old Butler home-
stead on Hawley St. By 1895 seven of the present ten houses had been constructed.
The other three, all double houses, were constructed early in the twentieth century,
and the street today still maintains its turn-of-the-century character, enhanced
particularly by the rows of fine Maple trees.

This house is two-and--half stories in height with ridge roof
and a two-and-a-half story gabled projection at either end of the facade. A one-story
porch with hipped roof, gabled entrance, Tuscan columns, balustrade and lattice base
extned across the facade.
