This house first appeared on the 1895 atlas and was owned by Fred Crossman, co-owner of Crossman and Polamtier, plumbers and stove and hardware dealers in Florence.

The house is a one-and-a-half story cottage with gable end of the street and a one-and-ahalf story gabled projection on the west-side. Both of the gables are hipped and there is a one-story bay who dow projecting from the side. A one-story porch extends across the facade and along the western side to the projection. The porch has a projection cornice, chamfered posts and decorative brackets. The front entrance is placed at the western corner of the facade, underneath the curve of the porch.
