

is the same granite as that used in the Dedham Courthouse construction. Both stores are crowned with an elaborate paneled and bracketed cornice masking the flat roof. (This differred from the simple two-slope arrangement common in Boston.) The Northampton cornices gave a greater dignity to the buildings.
