The Florence Furniture Co. was organized in 1873 by several prompent Florence industrialists, including Samuel Hill, Alfred Lilly and stronge Burr, and a brick factory erected just north of the railroad tracks Myrtle St. (now Bardwell St.). Additions were made to the plant in 380 and 1888, while the Mansard roof was replaced with a more vertical, in-covered third floor early in the 20th century.
