9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

The first Nathaniel Clark settled on South St. in 1705, the year of his marriage to Hannah Sheldon. He was the brother of Deacon John Clark who had settled on the street the year before. There were five generations of the Clark family, all with the first name of Nathaniel, who lived on this homestead. The house finally passed from the Nathaniel Clark line in the late 19th century.

The first Nathaniel Clark lived on the homestead until his death in 1767. His son, Lieutenant Nathaniel, lived there from his birth in 1706 until his death in 1773. He was a selectman of the town in 1751 and from 1761 to 1764.

The house is two-and-a-half stories in height with ridge roof and central chimney. The dwelling exhibits the characteristic break in the rear roof slope where a lean-to has been added to the original one-room deep structure, making the "saltbox". On the five-bay facade the upper story windows meet the line of the eaves and the central entrance is flanked by pilasters and covered by a one-story hipped roof porch with squre posts and diagonally-braced balustrade.
